### Loudoun County Announces Changes to Rent Assistance Program; More People May Be Eligible

Loudoun County residents who are experiencing difficulty paying rent as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic may be eligible for rent payment assistance from two programs: the county's Limited Rent Assistance program (LRA) and the Commonwealth of Virginia's Rent Relief Program (RRP).

Recent changes in the Virginia RRP will be reflected in the county's LRA program. Residents may now be eligible for one or the other of these programs, based on their family size and income. More residents may now qualify for rent assistance as a result of these changes, which allow for a greater range of income eligibility.

## New Guidance for the Fully Vaccinated

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has issued new guidelines on how people who have been fully vaccinated against COVID-19 can start to do some things that they had stopped doing because of the pandemic.

People are considered fully vaccinated two weeks after their second dose in a two-

dose series, such as the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines, or two weeks after a single-dose vaccine, such as Johnson & Johnson's Janssen vaccine.



- If you have been fully vaccinated, some of the things the CDC says you can do include:
  - Gathering indoors with fully vaccinated people without wearing a mask.
  - Gathering indoors with unvaccinated people from one other household without masks, unless any of those people or anyone they live with has an increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19
- The CDC says fully vaccinated people should continue to wear a mask in public and stay at least 6 feet apart from others, avoiding crowds and poorly ventilated spaces.

## Getting a COVID Vaccine: Step-by-Step



### **Step 1: The first step is submitting a pre-registration**

If you have not done so already you should submit a pre-registration form [online](#) or by calling **703-737-8300** if you do not have access to the internet.

Pre-registration forms create a database of names and contact info for those who have submitted. [See where we are on the waitlist.](#)

### **Step 2: Scheduling an Appointment**

When it is time to schedule an appointment, most will be notified through email, unless you requested to schedule by phone in your pre-registration.

If you will schedule online, expect to receive two emails: one from the Health Department with detailed instructions to complete the scheduling process, a second from the CDC to create a VAMS account.

- After creating your account, choose from the list of available appointment slots

### **Step 4: Your Appointment is Scheduled**

You will receive an email confirmation with your appointment date, time and location. If you need to cancel or reschedule for any reason, you can log back into your VAMS account to change your appointment.

### **Step 5: Getting Your Vaccine**

Go to your appointment as scheduled. When you arrive, you will check in and then be directed to the vaccination area.

### **Step 6: Follow Up**

If the vaccine you receive requires two doses, you will need to schedule a second appointment. Those who scheduled online will be reminded to schedule their second appointment by logging back into VAMS and choosing a date and time for

a second dose that is at least 21 or 28 days later, depending on the type of vaccine you received.

Those who scheduled over the phone can schedule their second appointment before leaving the vaccination site.

## Beware of Vaccine Scams

Protect yourself against COVID-19 vaccine scams!

Here are some scams to watch out for:

**Asking for payment:** COVID-19 vaccines are free. Someone is trying to scam you if they ask you to pay to put your name on a vaccine waiting list or to get the vaccine.

**Non-governmental website:** If you are asked to visit a website or give information online, make sure the website or email ends in ".gov." Credible sources about the COVID-19 vaccine in Loudoun County and Virginia

include [loudoun.gov/covid19vaccine](https://loudoun.gov/covid19vaccine) and [vaccinate.virginia.gov](https://vaccinate.virginia.gov).

**Asking for personal information:** State and local agencies will not ask for a Social Security number or immigration status. Health care providers may ask for your insurance information, but your vaccination will not be dependent on your insurance status.

**Protect Yourself**  
**AVOID COVID-19 Vaccine Scams**

As COVID-19 vaccine distribution begins, here are signs of potential scams:

- You are asked to pay out of pocket to get the vaccine.
- You are asked to pay to put your name on a vaccine waiting list or to get early access.
- Advertisements for vaccines through social media platforms, email, telephone calls, online, or from unsolicited/unknown sources.
- Marketers offering to sell or ship doses of the vaccine for payment.

✓ **Protect Yourself. Do not give out your personal information to unknown sources.**

## LCPS Vaccination POD Closes After More Than 21,000 Shots



### **Important Information**

Loudoun County Public Schools (LCPS) closed its Point of Distribution (POD) for COVID-19 vaccination at Brambleton Middle School on Friday, March 5, after successfully delivering more than 21,000 shots.

The POD, which first opened on January 15, delivered both Moderna and Pfizer vaccines during a seven-week period through a partnership with the Loudoun County Health Department and the County Office of Emergency Management. The operations of the LCPS Vaccination POD have moved from Brambleton Middle School to the County of Loudoun POD located at the Dulles Town Center Mall.

Health officials say while drug overdose deaths were already increasing in the months preceding the COVID-19 pandemic, studies suggest an acceleration of overdose deaths during the pandemic, led by synthetic opioids.

Anyone who uses opioids or knows someone who does is encouraged to sign up for Loudoun County's Revive! training on how to recognize and respond to an opioid overdose.

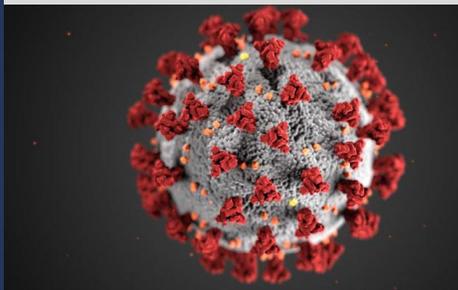
County website at [loudoun.gov/trees](https://loudoun.gov/trees) to coincide with Virginia's Arbor Day April 30.
